## **Peer review**

Every submitted article will undergo a double-blind peer review by two reviewers chosen by one of the managing editors. This managing editor alone is in charge of the organization of the peer review process.

Format and length of the review is up to the reviewer, however, every review should clearly state the corrections and improvements necessary and especially to assess the following: a) the innovative quality of the research questions and the (theoretical or methodological) perspective chosen; b) whether the data or source material used supports the questions asked; c) whether the arguments are convincing; d) the writing style; and e) the relevance of the article to the history of the body. The review should close with one of four recommendations: to publish “with no changes,” “with minor changes,” “only after major revisions,” or “not at all.” Articles will be rejected immediately if they receive the evaluation of “not at all” by one reviewer and “not at all” or “only after major revisions” by the other.

The reviews should be written within four weeks and must maintain a respectful tone.

Soon after receipt of the reviews, the managing editors will inform the authors by email of the results of the peer review and, if applicable, the procedure that follows.

The authors are obliged to consider suggestions for corrections that are marked as particularly important, either by making the changes in their articles or by submitting a refutation to the managing editor. He or she will evaluate whether or not this is the case together with the issue editor. If such suggestions for corrections are not taken into adequate consideration, the article can then be rejected. In cases of doubt, the managing editor decides whether the corrections have been given adequate consideration and thus ends the peer review process.

Proposals for a themed issue will be made anonymous by one of the managing editors and then submitted to the other editors for consideration.

Your proposal for a themed issue must be organized according to the format and subdivisions of the journal under the two headings (Analysis and Perspectives). The objective of the issue should be presented on no more than three pages, the planned articles should be sketched out on no more than one page each. Please do not mention the authors you have already recruited by name.

## **Copyright**

Body Politics adheres to a strict open access policy, which is becoming more and more common in the scholarly arena and which is now being emphatically supported by, for example, the German Research Foundation.

For this reason, all articles are placed under the Creative Commons License CC BY-NC-ND 3.0 DE. The copyright for the article remains with the author(s); however, according to the rules of this license agreement, individual articles can be made freely available and copied in any media format for non-commercial purposes as long as the bibliographical reference is correctly and fully given, including the first site of publication in this journal, Body Politics. The article may not be revised or altered in any other way. This is intended to insure maximum distribution for the articles and at the same time legal protection for the authors.

Each author will sign an individual publication agreement which contains the Creative Commons License and outlines the copyright issues.

Images, audio, and audiovisual material can be used in the articles or linked to it via hyperlinks in the text provided if the authors have acquired the right to do so or the material is in the public domain. Written proof of the copyright status of such material must be provided to the issue editors prior to publication. If the text of the article includes links to illustrative or source material, these links must lead to a legitimate and, if possible, reputable online archive that can guarantee the long-term storage of these sources.

All articles will be also published within the framework of a collaboration with the University and Research Library of Erfurt/Gotha in the Digital Library of Thuringia. This library provides each article with a Uniform Resource Name (URN) from the German National Library, a persistent, location-independent identifier for each article in the internet.

## **Text format**

Body Politics recognizes that each article can be downloaded independently and therefore does not require the format of the articles to be completely standardized.

The guidelines to be followed for bibliographic citation, in particular, are up to the authors. They are free to cite according to the conventions of their discipline, whether that be in brackets within the text or in footnote or endnotes, with or without short titles, bibliographies and lists of original sources. The method chosen must, however, remain consistent within the article. The issue editors will standardize primarily the type area, the line spacing, the fonts and the layout. Should the authors wish to publish images, audio and/or audiovisual material in their articles, they should assure that these are of adequate reproduction quality. Images should be sent additionally as JPG files.
